In the last issue of Springer Tails, I explained introduced the Board of Directors. As a continuation of recognizing those individuals who keep MAESSR functioning so smoothly, I would like to introduce you to the MAESSR Coordinators and the volunteers who assist them. As we now have had over 1000 dogs through our doors, I thought it would be a fitting time to offer some insight into the work necessary to make this all possible.

MAESSR is an all-volunteer organization. There are no paid positions within MAESSR. Space does not permit me to name every volunteer by name, but please know that we deeply appreciate all the work that is done on behalf of our dogs. This is the first of two columns on those who work tirelessly for the dogs.

Application Coordinators – Kathleen O'Neill and Sue Geckle – Dividing our service area between the North and South, Kathleen and Sue oversee all aspects of the application process from application through to approval. They assist in training interviewers, reviewing all interviews and finally making the decision on whether or not to approve an applicant. In these tasks, Kathleen and Sue are expertly assisted by **Teri Wiley** who performs the initial screening of applications and assigns them to interviewers.

Interviewers – Our Interviewers speak with applicants to assess the applicants' suitability to adopt a MAESSR foster dog. As part of the process, they also contact veterinary and personal references. Finally, they write substantial reports and provide their opinion on whether a home should be permitted to adopt a MAESSR dog. In all that they do, the Interviewers keep in the forefront of their mind that a Springer relies upon their judgment and thoroughness for their future happiness.

Financial Coordinator/Treasurer – Gale Blackmer – Talk about details! Gale is responsible for receiving virtually all income from MAESSR and reimbursing foster homes for approved expenditures. It sounds much simpler than it is. She must keep accurate records to report to the Board as well as to provide to our accountant for tax purposes. In her tenure Gale has regularized many of our functions. As she steps down, she leaves a clear path for **Russ Cherry** our incoming treasurer.

Lisa Roth, Corresponding Secretary, does an outstanding job sending personal notes to all donors acknowledging their gifts to MAESSR.

Fundraising Coordinator – Kim Bolster –

I cannot think of one person who has done more to keep MAESSR in the forefront of peoples' minds while raising money at the same time as Kim has done. Kim single-handedly masterminds our fundraising program. Much like Midas, all Kim touches turns to gold. All the while, Kim also coordinates our annual picnics, newsletters, and endeavors to expand and improve upon MAESSR's community support and presence.

Our **Regional Event Coordinators** work with Kim to get MAESSR in front of the public. They coordinate local events; bring merchandise, information and a ton of enthusiasm to many dog-related events.

Our virtual **Welcome Wagon is Mary Beach**. Mary sends out celebratory cards and condolence cards and maintains MAESSR's scrapbook and memorabilia. Having received both types of cards from Mary, I can attest to her consummate ability to say the right thing at the right time.

Follow-Up Coordinator – Clare Adams – Clare provides a very important service. She and Linda Johnston follow up with our adoptive homes after they have taken their MAESSR dog home. Their hard work allows us to identify potential problems while they are still small and solvable. In so doing, we improve our retention rate and more importantly, improve the adoption experience for both adoptive homes and our Springers.



Conducting Home Checks

In the last edition of Springer Tails, I explained how you could make a difference by interviewing applicants that want to adopt a Springer from MAESSR. In this issue, I'd like to detail another step in the approval process, the home check.

After a MAESSR volunteer completes an interview with an applicant and secures a vet reference, the interviewer may still have some unanswered questions or concerns about the family. In such cases, our Application Coordinator may ask that a home check be performed.

In doing a home check, you would contact applicants to set up a convenient time to visit them at their homes and meet the other members of their families, including any pets. Our Application Coordinator supplies specific questions to ask or areas of concern that need to be investigated before the family can be approved to adopt. It's the responsibility of the volunteer performing the home check to make sure that any concerns are addressed, investigated and discussed with the Application Coordinator.

For instance, if a family has never had a Springer before and is not sure if

a high-energy dog is the right choice for them, you may be asked to bring your Springer along to assess how the family responds and interacts with your Springer. Or perhaps the interviewer needs someone to inspect the yard to make sure it's a secure area for a Springer to run and play. In such instances, you may need to examine the yard, check the fencing or look for any possible hazards. Or maybe the applicant doesn't know if his or her own dog will tolerate another dog, and you will need to introduce your dog to determine if the applicant's dog will tolerate other dogs. These are just a few examples of instances where a home check may be necessary.

Also, whenever new families offer to foster for us, MAESSR volunteers conduct home visits to assure us that they would provide safe, caring foster homes for our Springers. We even provide you with a list of questions and helpful hints to aid you in your assessment of the foster family.

Conducting a home check only takes a couple hours of your time and is a great way to help MAESSR and meet other Springer enthusiasts. By doing home checks, you play an essential role in helping our Springers find wonderful forever homes that are safe, secure, and filled with love.

SPRINGER HEALTH

Ears

Springer ears are one of their defining characteristics- without those floppy ears the rest of the dog just wouldn't be the same. However, those pendulous ears set up a very specific environment under all the cuteness and flop, and that environment often favors the production of problems.

Even without the floppy outer covering, the ear canal of any dog is set up to be susceptible to infection due to the canal having a vertical component leading down to a horizontal component. Debris must work its way upward to get out of the canal.

Disease in the ear canal often stems from the over-production of ear wax in response to irritation. Irritation is frequently caused by allergies (very common in spaniels), foreign material such as grass awns and overgrowth of hair in the canals. The ear wax contains moisture, which promotes the growth of bacteria and yeast. With springers, we add the floppy ear flap that provides a dark, warm environment and prevents circulation of fresh air, and these factors merge with the previous factors to cause severe or recurrent infections.

Signs that could indicate that your springer has an ear infection include scratching or rubbing their ears, shaking their head or crying out when their ears are handled. If the dog scratches his ears or shakes his head hard enough, a blood vessel in the ear flap may burst and a "hematoma" may result. This would appear as a swollen area in the flap of the ear.

Treatment of an ear infection depends on the severity. Your veterinarian should examine your dog in order to determine the severity and underlying cause of the infection. If your springer has not had problems before and especially if the problem exists on one side or is very painful, your vet may want to sedate the dog for comfort and safety and look down inside the canal to remove foreign material and debris. A sample of the debris can be examined under a microscope to look for yeast, bacteria and ear mites (although ear mites are rarely found in normal, adult dogs). If the infection is mild, you may be able to keep the ears clean at home and apply medication. More severe infection may require flushing under sedation.

If your springer suffers repeatedly from ear infections, you might consider

testing for allergies. Both food related and air-borne allergies can cause ear infections. Treatment for the allergy may stop the ear infections or at least decrease their severity.

There are many medicated cleaning products on the market as well as home remedies for keeping ears clean. I have had the best luck with the home remedy often called "Blue Power", but it is best to discuss your choices with your own veterinarian. Frequency of cleaning the ears varies from dog to dog, but if your products are working, you shouldn't have to clean the ears more than once every week or two and you shouldn't be seeing much wax production.

Medications for ear infections also abound, and should be used based on what examination of the debris in each dog's ears has shown. As an example, if you use over the counter ear mite remedy when there are not any mites present, you might just increase irritation, and thus increase ear wax production, leading to worsening of the infection.

Sometimes, ear infections will be severe enough to warrant systemic medications as well as topical. This could include corticosteroids if there is a lot of swelling and inflammation, antibiotics if a lot of pus is present in the discharge and antifungal drugs for stubborn yeast infections. I have resorted to using oral antifungals in patients that were too painful or too wiggly to apply topical medications effectively as well.

Besides medicating the ears, you can also help prevent ear infections by keeping the hair around the opening to the ear canal trimmed to increase air flow. I've met a few dogs that learned to wear their ears up in a "scrunchie" as well to help keep the ears dry and well ventilated.

In closing, although springers have the right anatomy to predispose them to ear infections, there are some extremely useful products out there to keep wax production down and to keep bacteria and fungal growth under control so that our dogs don't have to suffer the consequence of those beautiful pendulous ears.

calls, several people sprung into action to make sure we got fed, walked and loved.


We really would prefer that you never, ever, ever leave us. However, if you must leave us, please be sure our caretaker knows all of these important tips.

ESSentials

It's official, Spring 2005 has arrived and along with it come those cute little black and white critters we ALL want to avoid. You got it, SKUNKS! This story comes from Alicia Smith, one of our volunteers and adoptive families and her MAESSR dog, Rickie.

"She had escaped under the privacy fence, and when my husband realized she was out, went out in the front yard, and found her finishing it off. She knew she was in trouble, so he yelled at Rickie. Up the stairs she went looking for me, and hid under my bed. I didn't have my MAESSR cookbook with the great skunk scent removal recipe, so we sent our daughter out to buy tomato juice (which doesn't work) and started bathing her with regular shampoo. I attempted to go to work, but had to leave early to spare my poor colleagues because as the day progressed, more of the "skunk" smell came out. On the way home, I called our very trusted vet, and she told me to try baking soda, peroxide, and some of the dog's shampoo. After about three or four baths, Rickie wasn't too bad." What I should have used was:

Here is the recipe from our MAESSR COOKBOOK for your DOG:

- ♦ 1 quart 3 % Hydrogen Peroxide
- ♦ 1/4cup baking soda
- ♦ 1 tsp dishwashing liquid

Mix all ingredients (concoction will fizz). Wet dog thoroughly and knead solution into dogs coat. Solution is NOT toxic, but don't get it near your dog's eyes, ears, nose or mouth. Use a sponge to dab the solution on dog's head. Leave on for about 5 minutes. Rinse thoroughly and towel dry. Repeat as needed until smell subsides. Any discoloration of the coat will fade within days or weeks.

CAUTION: DO NOT STORE, can explode!

"Now, as for the house: If your Springer went anywhere specific, like under your bed...that carpet is toast. Where Rickie went and lay, we scrubbed and scrubbed, even with baking soda and peroxide, but it didn't help. We opened all the windows and turned on the "fan" portion of the a/c unit to circulate the air. We kept it that way for about 24 hrs. We sprayed ALL of the carpet and furniture down with Fabreeze a couple of times. That seemed to take care of all of the smell in the house in general...plus I burned a lot of candles for a few days! This is an experience I would not wish on my worse enemy."

THE TRAINING CORNER

CGC Challenge!

The American Kennel Club has instituted the Canine Good Citizen (CGC) Program to (1) teach responsible dog ownership to owners; and (2) certify dogs that have the training and behaviors needed to be reliable, well-behaved members of their families and communities.

To be awarded a CGC, a dog must be evaluated by an AKC certified evaluator. MAESSR is very fortunate that several of its volunteers are certified by AKC as CGC evaluators. The evaluation itself is a 10-step test consisting of items designed to demonstrate that the dog is well under control, and that dog and handler have an understanding of some basic obedience commands. The test is performed with the dog on leash, and dogs are not required to perform with the precision necessary in formal obedience. Although food is not permitted as a reward during the actual test, handlers are encouraged to interact with their dogs during the test through verbal cues, praise, and body language.

MAESSR will be offering CGC tests at all three picnics this summer, and we hope for a large group of aspiring CGCs! In fact, we've set a goal of five CGCs per picnic. So come out to a picnic, take the test, and cheer for your fellow MAESSR adoptees as they take the test. Which picnic will produce the highest number of new CGCs: Frederick, MD; Langhorne, PA; or Goochland, VA??? We challenge you to start practicing now so that you'll be ready this summer. In the meantime, go to the AKC website (www.akc.org), search on CGC, and read more about these 10 test elements:

Test 1: Accepting a friendly stranger – evaluator greets the handler and the dog shows no resentment or shyness.

Test 2: Sitting politely for petting – evaluator pets the dog on the head.

Test 3: Appearance and grooming – evaluator combs or brushes the dog, lightly examines the ears, and picks up each front foot.

Test 4: Walking on a loose lead – evaluator instructs the handler to walk a course including a right turn, left turn, and halt.

Test 5: Walking through a crowd – dog and handler walk around and pass close to several people.

Test 6: Sit and down on command and staying in place – dog must respond correctly to sit and down commands. Dog must stay (in either down or sit position) while handler walks to the end of a 20-foot leash.

Test 7: Coming when called – handler asks the dog to stay, walks to the end of the 20-foot line, and calls the dog.

Test 8: Reaction to another dog – two handlers with dogs approach each other, stop and shake hands. Dogs should show no more than a causal interest in each other.

Test 9: Reaction to distraction – this test demonstrates that the dog is confident at all times when faced with common distractions (jogger, shopping cart, umbrella, etc.)

Test 10: Supervised separation – evaluator takes dog's leash, and handler goes out of sight for three minutes. Dog does not show strong agitation or nervousness.

Winchester, The Therapy Dog

Winchester II became a member of the Bennett family in April 2004. He was a neglected owner relinquishment – heavily matted, rarely exercised and weighing in at 83 pounds! Once at their home, the Bennetts immediately recognized they had adopted a very special dog with unlimited and untapped potential.

Within two weeks of his adoption, Winchester was enrolled in an obedience class. He excelled and quickly earned his Canine Good Citizen as well as his Therapy Dog International certification. In addition to training, Winchester was also gaining a much missed stability and structure in his life. Lots of exercise, food control and lots of love increased his level of confidence and also brought his weight down 27 pounds!

With a treasure like Winchester, Linda Bennett wanted to share him with the community. With his Canine Good Citizen and therapy certifications, many avenues opened. They joined a therapy group and Winchester now makes visits to an area prison, nursing homes and is part of special reading program. In a program with the local

library and school district, Winchester is matched with a 5-12 year old student who reads to him. A very successful program and concept nationwide, this work helps build the confidence and reading skills of the child.

Winchester and his family are also part of a groundbreaking program at Bucknell University (Lewisburg, PA). Bucknell had strict regulations that no dogs are allowed on campus or in buildings. Linda Bennett presented a proposal to the college administration advocating therapy dogs visits be offered to the students. After four months of discussion, negotiation, and education, an exception was made to the University policy. The first therapy dog visit to Bucknell was in December 2004. Eight dogs attended and close to 400 students! Students waited in lines to see and interact with the dogs. Hugs, lots of petting, tales of their family dog, and tears were all present at the first historic visit. A subsequent visit in February 2005 had several hundred students waiting to see the dogs! Winchester's campus visits average 3-4 times a semester.

This July, Winchester will be 5 years old. What a success story – a tribute to the Bennetts and to Winchester. He is an active and much loved member of his family and helping his community and individuals better their lives. A true MAESSR treasure - a diamond in the rough!
