

In the Winter 2005 issue, I covered the Board of Directors. Last issue (Spring), I started highlighting just a few of the people who give their time, energy and love to MAESSR and the dogs. Below is Part 2 of the people behind MAESSR:

Foster Dog Coordinator - Debbie Lipcsey -

Debbie is responsible for overseeing our dogs from their entry into MAESSR until they depart to their forever homes. Debbie works with the Shelter Liaisons and Owner Relinquishment Coordinator to identify dogs coming into MAESSR. She then identifies foster homes for them. A daunting task - but MAESSR has never turned away a dog for lack of a foster home. Debbie then works with foster homes to ensure that our dogs are well cared for, trained and placeable. She is their first new friend.

Foster Homes are truly the down in the trenches volunteers. It is into their homes that Springers in all conditions come. They treat their health needs, address training issues, and most importantly love them. Then, selflessly, they let their beloved foster dogs go on to their forever homes. Debbie Lipcsey and Jane Davis, our Foster Home Mentor Coordinator, endeavor to ease things for new and veteran foster homes. They both offer advice, insight and support.

Owner Relinquishment Coordinator - Angie Epling

- Angie and her team work with families who for any number of reasons want to surrender their dogs to MAESSR. Angie trains her volunteers, tracks incoming dogs, asks the tough questions after she received "OR" dog write-ups and finally, passes the information to Debbie Lipcsey to arrange the dog's entry into the MAESSR Foster program.

Shelter Liaisons work with Debbie Lipcsey and shelters in their areas to pull abandoned and stray Springers. Theirs can be a very difficult task. Not all shelters are rescue friendly. Others can only hold dogs for a short period of time. Often they can spend hours over a period of a few days to pull a dog and get them to safety.

Senior Dog Coordinator - Joan Cromwell -

Joan works tirelessly to find homes for the hardest of dogs to place, our seniors. Through her posts to our email lists and his regular column, Joan and her Springer, Norman, sing the praises of our beloved seniors.

Transport Coordinators - Joe Harkins and Warren Reeves -

Joe and Warren open and close the deal so to speak. They arrange transports to bring Springers to their foster homes. Then on the other side, they arrange the transports that bring those same dogs to their forever homes. Often they are juggling multiple transports to differing states and differing homes. Time and again, they coordinate smooth transports.

Website Coordinator - Kelly Gribble - She started out doing updates and now oversees all aspects of our web presence. Aply assisted by several volunteers, Kelly keeps our website up to date, ensures a presence on Petfinder.com, and thanks to JoAnne Mottola who is developing a new look for the site (previews coming soon!)

Volunteer Coordinator - Linda Foster - One of MAESSR's founders, Linda works with several assistants to recruit, screen and train MAESSR volunteers. A low key, behind the scenes job, it is of utmost importance. Every aspect of MAESSR is dependent upon the trustworthiness of our volunteers.

Communications Volunteers - These folks are the frontline of MAESSR. They answer our telephone line and emails. Due to the volunteers' thoroughness and politeness, people's first impression of MAESSR is always a good one!

Adoptions Coordinator - That's me. I have always said it is the greatest job in MAESSR. I get to match adoptive homes with their new Springers. It's a little bit science, a little bit gut instinct. Nothing is better than an enthusiastic response from a newly matched adoptive home or the email that follows after their new Springer comes to their home. I would not be able to do this job if all of the people listed above were not so ably doing theirs.

To our volunteers: On behalf of all of MAESSR's Springers and adoptive homes, as well as the many, many other people whose lives we have touched, Thank you, Thank you very much.



CGC CHALLENGE CONTINUED!

As noted in the last newsletter, MAESSR is offering Canine Good Citizen (CGC) tests at all three picnics this summer. The American Kennel Club's CGC Program teaches responsible dog ownership to owners; and certifies dogs that have the training and behaviors needed to be reliable, well-behaved members of their families and communities.

The challenge is definitely on! The Walkersville, Maryland picnic produced seven new Canine Good Citizens, exceeding MAESSR's goal of five new CGCs per picnic. The Marylanders have set the bar very high for the Pennsylvania and Virginia picnics! The CGC tests at the Maryland picnic were conducted by MAESSR volunteers Kim Bolster and Debbie Lipscey, who have been certified by the AKC as testers. Kim and Debbie reported that there was quite a large group of spectators watching the testing, and they hope that some of those spectators and their dogs will take the test at the Pennsylvania or Virginia picnic.

As a reminder, the CGC evaluation is a 10-step test consisting of items designed to demonstrate that the dog is well under control, and that dog and handler have an under-

standing of some basic obedience commands. The test is performed with the dog on leash. Although food and toys are not permitted as rewards during the actual test, handlers can use verbal commands, hand signals, and especially praise to encourage their dogs during each of the 10 exercises. If you're planning on attending the Langhorne, Pennsylvania picnic on July 30, or the Goochland, Virginia picnic on September 17, start practicing now so that you'll be ready for the test. The AKC has designated September 17 as Responsible Dog Ownership Day, and what better way to commemorate the day than by training for, and passing the CGC test. Help MAESSR reach its goal of five new CGCs per picnic!

SPRINGER HEALTH

Everybody who owns dogs for any length of time knows that eventually a situation will arise where the dog needs veterinary care beyond routine check ups. However, there can also be times where you might need to differentiate between needing immediate care versus being OK to wait a few hours or until the next morning. Being a veterinarian working exclusively in emergency care, I see the full gamut from "should have been here days ago" to the "just happened severe trauma" to the "why are these people worrying about this at 2:00 am??" The following information may help you decide what is best for your dog in the unfortunate event that he or she becomes ill or has an accident.

The first section here will deal with problems that are probably safe to wait until the next day to be seen. The advantage to waiting is that you will be able to see your own veterinarian who is more familiar with you and your pets. The disadvantage is that if the condition is more serious than it initially seemed, your pet may become more seriously ill and have an adverse effect on the outcome of treatment. Always trust your best judgment and if you feel your pet is sick enough to require urgent care, don't hesitate to go, no matter what time it is.

If your pet misses a meal, but does not seem sick in any other way, it's OK to wait and see how the dog is in the morning. Check to be sure the dog hasn't found an alternate food source.

If your pet has vomited or had diarrhea 1-2 times, but the vomitus or stool does not contain blood or foreign material (cloth, chewed up toys, rocks) it is OK to wait. Make sure the dog is not painful, and that any vomiting or diarrhea efforts are not continuous.

If your dog becomes lame, but can still bear weight at least partially on the leg, doesn't show overt signs of pain & can get comfortable when resting or if the lameness is intermittent it can wait until morning. If your dog can't bear weight on the leg or is painful, he or she should be seen the same day.

If your dog starts drinking excessive amounts of water and/or has excessive amounts of urine output or accidents in the house they definitely need to be checked. It can wait until morning unless you notice any blood in the urine, straining to urinate, or pain associated with urination.

If your dog is itching a lot, but not damaging his or her skin (no blood or hair loss) and the itching is not continuous it can wait until morning- unless the sound of the dog itching keeps you awake all night, in which case you might as well go now.

This next section deals with more of a

gray area. These are all serious problems that need to be seen as soon as possible, but can wait a few hours for an appointment or for you to get to the veterinarian of your choice. These all definitely need to be seen on the same day.

Vomiting and/or diarrhea with a few streaks of blood as opposed to pools or clots of blood would indicate need for same day care. Once again make sure the animal is not in pain and check the vomitus and stool for foreign material.

If the dog is itching to the point of self-mutilation, it should be seen quickly to prevent making things worse.

If the dog has some difficulty breathing but is calm it should be seen as soon as possible that day. The dog should be able to breathe well enough to eat and drink and rest. They may or may not be coughing.

If you even think your dog swallowed a foreign object, get it checked out within a few hours. Foreign bodies are much easier to deal with right away than a few days later.

Mild burns- such as from a heat source or chemicals should be seen as soon as possible. More extensive burns should go immediately.

If you live where frostbite is a possibility, or hypothermia- it's best to get the dog examined after an excessive exposure to cold than to "wait and see" if they'll be OK.

Any sort of injury that is not a true emergency, but that will worsen with time should be taken care of the same day. Examples are small wounds, torn nails & welts (hives).

Now this last part will cover the true emergencies. In the event that anything like this happens to your dog, have a plan so you will know what to do. Know your veterinarian's hours and after hours coverage. Know where the local emergency clinic(s) are if your vet is not available. Call ahead to find out if there's any first aid to be done while you are en route. Have a plan in place financially so that the monetary aspect of an emergency doesn't add to your distress level (many people "into dogs" keep a credit card sole for use in dog medical emergencies). Overall, stay calm- you can't help your dog if you aren't in control of yourself.

Any injury that results in continuous pain, eye protruding from socket, bone protruding from leg with or without blood requires urgent care.

Any penetrating wound to the chest or abdomen is a potentially life-threatening situation even if it doesn't look that bad on the outside. Go right away.

Any exposure to poison or ingestion of medication not intended for the pet. Bring the container if possible- if not bring the commercial name or the ingredients. Don't wait for your dog to "act like it's poisoned" - in some cases it

may be too late to save them if symptoms are present.

Any attempt to urinate or defecate unsuccessfully, with the dog continuously trying indicates an immediate trip to the veterinarian is needed.

Pain without obvious cause is another reason to go immediately if the pain is continuous and without relief.

If the dog is bleeding (from anywhere) and doesn't seem able to stop- apply pressure and get to the vet's.


If your dog is delivering puppies and keeps trying without success or stops trying for several hours when you know more are present- go right away.

Inability to breath with raspy respirations, blue color to tongue, gasping- obviously needs immediate help.

Vomiting or diarrhea or urination with a significant amount of blood (not just streaks) warrants immediate attention.

Any loss of mental continuity such as tremors, staggering, convulsions, unconscious, loss of balance, head tilt, and temperament changes all would fall into the immediate help category.

Hopefully, for everyone reading this, your dogs will never need help for anything in the "immediately" category. But in case of emergency, hopefully this will give you some clarity as to how quickly you should act.

Soon he is on his way to his wonderful forever home in Virginia!

Now....Leesburg, VA...
July 2005

At last Moe is enjoying the good life he deserves! His forever parents, Jim and Cathy Stevenson, lavish him with love and attention. They provide him with the special medical care he needs to overcome his health challenges. He is now a robust 69 pounds,

a good weight this tall handsome boy. He is recovering from surgery to remove excess skin from his eyes, which contributes to the chronic infections. In about a year he'll have more surgery to remove fatty pads on his joints caused by a rare condition. He is seeing a dermatologist and enjoying freedom from sores and infections at last!

In addition to his mom and dad and Springer sister, Moe's family consists of four Guinea pigs and five foster Guinea pigs from the rescue organization. Moe is very curious about his Guinea pig siblings and actually sniffs and touches noses with them! He finds that they, like sister Maggie, are not interested in play of any sort! Moe

loves running and playing in his fenced yard. He is an expert ball retriever and is hardly ever without his beloved green tennis ball in his mouth.

At last Moe is relaxing! Life is good! He is finally overcoming his separation anxiety and is fortunate that he is not left alone for long periods of time. He follows Dad around everywhere and wants to be able to see him. He is indeed a "velcro Springer"!


I would like to introduce Jim Perry, or more recently known to MAESSR as "REDLEG-64", our Springer Spaniel stained glass expert. Jim now resides in Port Byron, Illinois but has traveled to places as far away as Munich, Germany in 1958 and Viet Nam in the '60's. I met Jim in 1964 in El Paso, Texas. His family lived across the street and we have been friends for over 40 years. I asked Jim to tell us why REDLEG-64?

"People always wonder what the significance is of Redleg-64, well this is a handle that I use. I was a field artillery officer in the army and the infantry guys referred to us as redlegs. The infantry officers were know as "legs" or "sticks" back during the Vietnam War. The "64" stands for a very significant year of my life. The red for Artillery comes from the civil war. Field artillery officers wore a red sash around their mid section.

Reason: If they were hit and bleeding, their soldiers could not tell and hopefully would not break ranks."

When I found out he was doing stained glass, I was very surprised... he wasn't the artsy type in high school. So imagine my surprise when I saw what wonderful pieces he was creating. He told me he first saw stained glass in Germany as a boy, and always thought he might want to try it some day. When he retired from the military, he gave it a shot and aren't we glad he did! He started his first piece about 5 or 6 yrs ago, and the rest, as they say, is history. His first piece was a Christian Cross. It was made from plain window glass and was anything but professional.
